Teachers' Feedback Analysis Report (Session 2022-23)

The quality of a higher education institution depends on the quality of teachers. The teacher has to play a multi-dimensional role to convey the nuances of the subject to the heterogeneous students of a class. Since teachers are the primary channel of knowledge transfer, their feedback on learning outcomes, curriculum content, proper sequencing of curriculum content, etc. is crucial for the smooth running of the institution. Feedback from teachers is very important for the overall development of the students and for evaluating the facilities provided by the college.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), Netaji Subhash Ashram Mahavidyalaya has conducted a feedback process to get teachers' views. Therefore, the IQAC has taken offline feedback with questionnaire from teachers for the session 2022 - 2023.

A total of 23 teachers have been surveyed. These data are then summarized and analyzed with tables and diagrams by applying suitable cartographic techniques to reach various conclusions. The data collected are statistically processed and converted into indicators. Functional interrelationships among the indicators are then analyzed by the IQAC and a summary report was prepared.

Teachers Feedback Analysis and Interpretation:

1. Are you satisfied with the present syllabus?




Figure 01: Satisfaction with the current syllabus.




Figure 02: The CBCS is better than the 1+1+1 system.




Figure 03: Current curriculum is adequate to enrich students' subject-specific knowledge.




Figure 04: The current syllabus is job oriented.




Figure 05: Students are disciplined and respect the teaching and non-teaching staff members.

Most of the teachers (100 percent) agreed to this question. None of the teachers disagreed to this question. No one said for not sure in this case (Table 05 and Figure 05).




Figure 06: The prescribed books are available in the Library in sufficient numbers.




Figure 07: Computer and Internet facilities for ICT based teaching of teachers.




Figure 08: Adequate opportunities and support for faculty members to enhance their skills and qualifications.




Figure 09: Faculty member's satisfaction with staff common room, toilet, canteen and drinking water facilities in the college.




Figure 10: Practices on environmental conservation and initiative in implementing waste management practices.




Figure 11: Principal is approachable and accessible and believes in team efforts/building partnership.

Suggestions from Teachers:

- 1. Medical facilities should be improved.
- 2. Teacher student ratio should be as per the norms.
- 3. Non-teaching work should not be given to the teaching staff.
- 4. Internet facilities should be improved for better connectivity.
- 5. Staff common room should be modernized and separate toilets should be provided.
- 6. The number of smart class rooms should be increased and maintenance of the existing ones should be done.
- 7. More classrooms should be built in line with the increasing strength of the students.

Conclusion:

Therefore, it is evident from the above analysis that, teachers expressed their satisfaction for all the questions except few areas. It was also observed that the college has scope for improvement for its staff common room infrastructures, toilet, drinking water, canteen facility, library, computer and internet facilities. Teachers were also asked to suggest the areas in which they want the institution to improve. The major areas raised by them were to ensure more classrooms, staff common room infrastructures, toilet, drinking water, canteen facility, medical facility, library, and computer and internet facilities.
